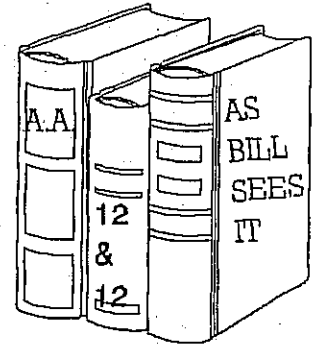
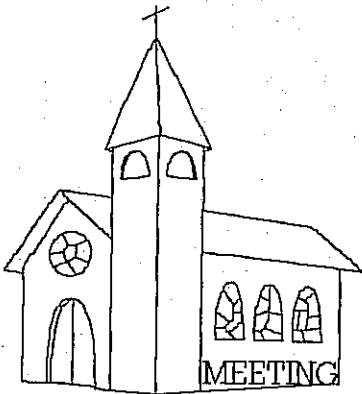

I've been sober three and one half years now and I have what I consider to be an important message...one I hope you will print...in case somewhere, someone in AA may be experiencing this same problem and know that people stop believing in you or when you hear through the "AA grapevine" others are wondering how you haven't drank yet, you know it's a greater power than yourself. It's OK to continue to do the best you can and struggle through whatever character defects you're left with once the alcohol is removed.

Somewhere in the Big Book it speaks to laughing petty rivalry and gossip out of existence. That is the core of AA, unity and belief in one another.

How many times have we heard it's a 'We' program, 'AA Unity'. When others judge you, and they may, it hurts, it stings, and it can stir up a lot of old baggage. Remember, we are all sick people, trying to get better. I try not to judge because I know how much it hurts, but in all honesty, I have, too.



I go to the Big Book and just read about the way the program is suppose to be and try to get back on track.

But if people, even those in AA, have given up on you or wonder how you haven't taken a drink just let them know it wasn't you at all. It's a power greater than yourself.

Please don't use these things as excuses to stay away from meetings or think everyone in AA is like that, they're not!

Don't give up on yourself, no matter how bad or sick you're behaviors are. If you are sincerely trying to work the program. . . recovery takes time.

And more importantly, don't give up on AA. It does work, through the grace of God, it has kept me sober. Thanks for letting me share.

Without a doubt.

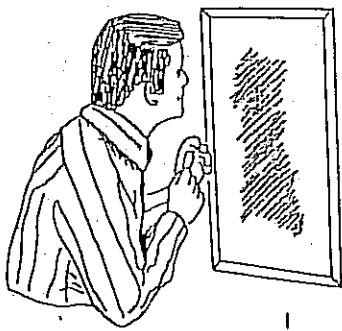
This time it's gone.

REFLECTIONS

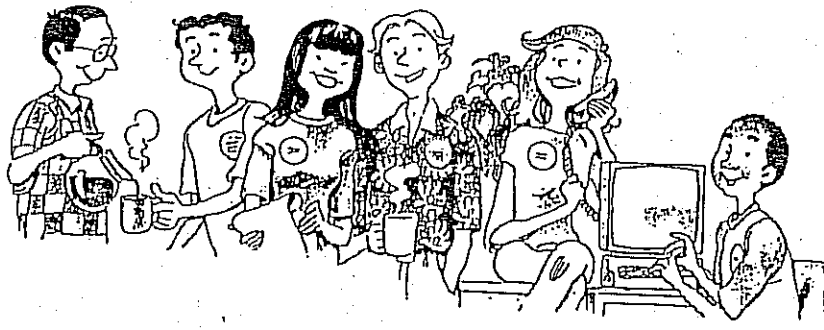
I have gone through many changes in 7 years of sobriety. I came into AA with a feeling of absolute hopelessness and despair and could see no purpose to life. I now am able to count hope as one of my strongest gifts and I believe that, while things do not always work out the way I would like them to. They always work out the way they are supposed to. I learned that I have no more right to condemn myself than I have to condemn other people. I have gone from self-loathing to self acceptance; from dwelling on the faults of others, to looking for the good that is in all of us; from literally cringing every time I heard the word God at a meeting, to the absolute connection that there is a power greater than myself that loves me and will guide me, if I let it; from severe depression in the last year of my drinking and the early part of my sobriety to feeling good most of the time. I have learned the importance of trying to place principles before personalities, although I don't always succeed in doing so. I've gone from mental confusion to relative stability and from being literally at the mercy of my emotions, to a sense of peace most of the time. I have learned not to try to fix something that already works. I remember some of the thoughts that used to run through my head at meetings during the first six months of my sobriety: Thoughts like “Well, maybe I'm really not an alcoholic after all, I drank mostly beer and every one knows that alcoholics are hooked on bourbon” and “Do I have to go to these meetings the rest of my life?” I finally

decided it didn't matter whether I was an alcoholic or not. I knew I couldn't drink. I wondered if staying sober was really worth it, but I can say now that I have never regretted one minute of my sobriety and every year sober has been better than the year before. I remember being sober five months and very confused, thinking that if I couldn't find out what made me an alcoholic, I would drink again. There was an old timer around who recognized my hang ups. Every time he saw me he would say two things to me, “alcoholism is caused by drinking alcohol” and “if you do not drink, you won't get drunk.” That is all he would say to me. I reached the point where I would look for that man as soon as I walked into a meeting so I could avoid him. I did not want to hear what he had to say. Then, about the 101st time he said it to me, everything fell into place. All I needed to do was not drink and go to meetings and things would be revealed to me. I learned that I could solve my drinking problems by not drinking and that my other problems might or might not get resolved by that. As long as I did not drink, I had one less problem to worry about. I did not leap to embrace the steps. I was motivated into action on every one of the steps when the pain of not doing them became too much to bear. There are no shortcuts. AA is indeed a way of life and is aptly described in the Big Book as a fellowship of the spirit. With every passing day, my debt to the fellowship becomes greater.

TOO YOUNG?

We all felt the same when we came to A.A. -- that we were too young to be alcoholics. Some of us hadn't been drinking that long. Some of us didn't drink hard liquor. Some of us didn't fall down or have memory lapses.

"Just sit down and listen," we were told. "You can always go back to drinking if you want. But first try some A.A. meeting, because you wouldn't be here at all if you didn't have a drinking problem."

Soon we heard that it doesn't matter how much you drink, where you drink, what you drink, or how old

you are -- what matters is what alcohol does to you inside. You are the best judge of whether or not you have a problem. And you know this from your gut -- whether you feel guilty, lonely, ashamed; whether alcohol is interfering in your life.

All of us felt strange about going to A.A. But we've come to see that A.A. saved our lives and gave us a new beginning -- it is the best thing that ever happened to us.

A recent couple of days introducing my 1-1/2 year old grandson to Lake Erie is but one example of this fulfillment. Try to explain the surf or sea shells to a kid of this age and walk down the beach holding his hand and you will know what I mean.

The ten years of sobriety celebrated last March have made life worth living, once again, just a Day at a Time.

THE ORIGIN OF THE SERENITY PRAYER

The Serenity Prayer was actually written by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr of the Union Theological Seminary, New York City, in about 1932.

It came to the attention of an early AA in 1947. He read it in an obituary notice in the New York Tribune. He liked it so much he brought it in to the little office on Vessey Street for Bill W. to read. When Bill and the staff read the little prayer, they felt that it particularly suited the needs of AA. Thus, the simple little prayer became part of the AA movement.

The prayer, as written by Dr. Niebuhr, is as follows:

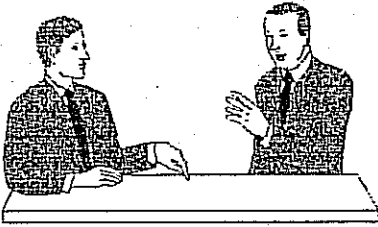
- 1.) God, give me the Serenity to accept things which cannot be changed;
- 2.) Give me courage to change things which must be changed;
- 3.) And the wisdom to distinguish one from the other.
- 4.) Living one day at a time; enjoying one moment at a time; Accepting hardship as the pathway to peace;
- 5.) Taking, as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it;
- 6.) Trusting that He will make all things right if I surrender to His will;
- 7.) That I may be reasonably happy in this life, and supremely happy with Him forever in the next.

Amen.

DUNGEONS AND DRUNKS

The longer in recovery, the more I run into a number of people who seem to be engaged in a new role playing game. They play at being sober. It's called "Dungeons & Drunks". You know them. they hang on to sobriety for a month or so, then "slip". OOPS! Time to hit the reset button and go back into AA for another round at recovery.

As recovering alcoholics working the Steps and Traditions, should we stand by and let this continue? The 12th step suggests carrying the message to other suffering alcoholics. Although the program is based on strength and hope of thousands, always remember this: it's only your suggestion this suffering alcoholic hears; sometimes it's not wanted.

When sponsoring, the responsibility of guiding the new person into the Steps and Traditions is clear, but what do you do about role playing behavior?

The old time sponsorship of hard-nosed attitude needs to be dusted off and used in this

situation. The role player must be brought to his senses fast, or you'll lose him. Alcoholism untreated leads to insanity or death. That's what *Alcoholics Anonymous* says in "There is a Solution" on page 24. Consider role playing as untreated alcoholism.

Thank God I've experienced only one slip in recovery. That was planned months in advance and executed flawlessly. Role playing at being sober resulted in high blood pressure, almost killing me. After this, my sponsor took a hard line, making me check in daily, work my steps on (his) schedule, and study *Alcoholics Anonymous*. No longer having time to play at being sober, I became sober. It's worked for over five years and there's not enough thanks in the world for him.

If you're faced with this kind of sponsee behavior, grow thick skin. Get hard-nosed, but NOT intolerant. In "Dungeons & Drunks" death is the only winner.
