

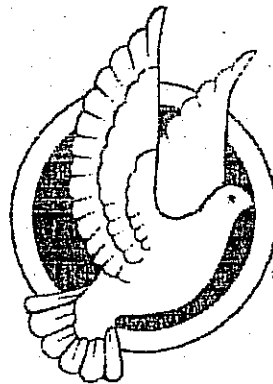

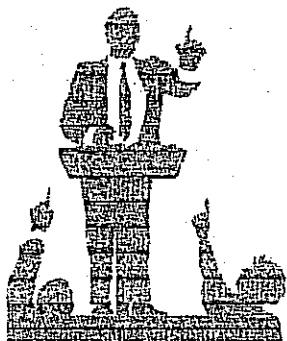

Each and every day, we fight the "intolerance" of Earth People and fight the "War" within ourselves. "Slavery" to the jug is self explanatory.



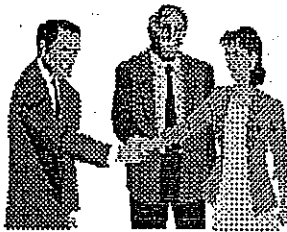

I heard that the New Frontiers was looking for articles from women concerning the problems particular to women in A.A. I thought of the ongoing behavior that has been

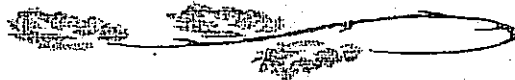

Although, I can rarely say the new woman has no part, for perhaps she craves attention, etc., truly a man with even a small amount of sobriety should know better early on. The bottom line after the romance, the breakup or even the changed locks and police restraining order, is someone, either one, could drink or die.

I witnessed an unbelievable scene at a meeting where a very pretty girl was coming

back after drinking. I don't know how serious this girl was, but it did not help her that a man on each side of her flirted and giggled with her throughout the meeting while the rest of the table attempted to share their experience, strength and hope. I don't know who played what part in this charade but I did not leave the table thinking we were talking about life and death. This kind of 13th stepping during a meeting was new to me.

Finally, girls today might remember that if someone is sober it does not follow that he is recovered or even a trustworthy person! Many of us are sick and to give out one's phone number, to accept a ride, to give a ride, etc. is risky at best. Getting to know our fellow members in our home groups, through other members, and after a word with our sponsors can save us from unnecessary danger. "Boys with boys and girls with girls" is a phrase which has many reasons for being. Early recovery is difficult, distractions can set us back on our journey and worse - end it altogether.

A word to impatient alcoholics: the program works best when we're...

UNDRUNK

The business of being undrunk is somewhat like indoor plumbing. In spite of the fact that I have never seen indoor plumbing listed as one of the components of the more abundant life, it sure raises hell if it is not working right.

I tried for three years to work the Steps without going to meetings or staying undrunk. That method leaves a great deal to be desired. One has to run and hide when the paper boy rings the doorbell. Brushing one's teeth causes acute nausea. It becomes necessary to keep a wash basin beside the bed. One also has a tendency to stagger and see double.

Finally, I was hurting so bad I simply wanted out, so I tried doing it undrunk for a change. I shook for a while, and I paced the floor till I nearly wore out the rug. I changed the light switches to silent ones, so the kids wouldn't snap them without warning and unnerve me. I imitated my neighbor's dog; he wasn't drinking either.

Pretty soon, the program began to work. I began to think more clearly and to accept myself just as I was — the way AA

has accepted me from the very beginning. Inasmuch as I didn't have the leverage to make deals with God, I let go and gave Him the whole miserable mess, to hand back to me when and if He saw fit.

I can accept today whether it is tragedy or triumph. "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." After several years, I am still getting used to the fact that is happening to me.

Becoming undrunk was the least of the benefits AA gave me, but an extremely important one nevertheless.

(I know— I tried it both ways!) As I continue going to meetings, my undrunkness has grown into genuine sobriety, which has rewards made-to-order for me. I could not possibly have been the architect of my own recovery.

In my neighborhood, we are extremely fortunate. We have a Higher Power who makes house calls.

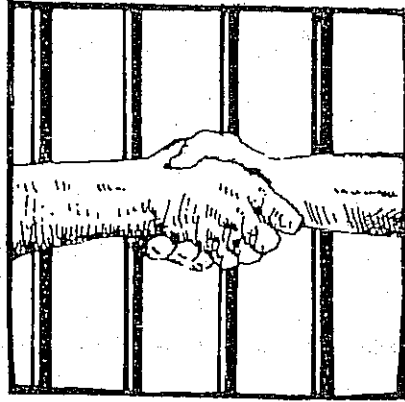

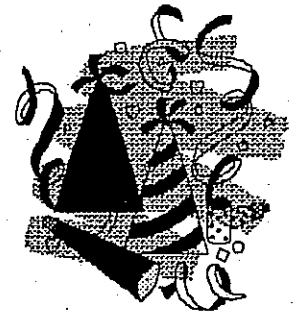
