





DEAR FELLOW AA'S:

My name is Guy and I'm an alcoholic. I'd like to share with you the miracle of my recovery. I'm 37 years old and an inmate at the Collins Correctional Facility. I ended up here after a very destructive relapse. I'd like to share with you, " what is was like-- what happened- and what it's like now."

In 1989 I entered a long term alcoholic rehab unit in Central New York. After a year I "graduated." I then went to a half-way house in Niagara Falls, N.Y. I was introduced to AA in my stay there, and I was a regular member of a South Towns Group for three years. I attended AA regularly but I was one of those alcoholics who did not believe that the Twelve Steps could work in my life. I tried to stay sober on my will power, not understanding God's will at all.

I went to AA only because it was suggested by the rehab and the halfway house. I never thought that "I" needed AA, nor did I believe alcoholism was a disease.

In December 1994, it all started with (1) split bottle of beer and within a month I was drinking every day! My life was truly unmanageable and the downward slide was well on its way. The "Disease", had resurfaced. I lost everything I had worked so hard for since 1989, and I was arrested in 1996. I thank God for my arrest, for It saved my life!

During the Summer of 1996, I got back to AA and the rooms of recovery. I knew that something was \(\text{v}\) wrong with me. I accepted that I was an alcoholic! Today I can see the miracle of recovery in my life. I've allowed myself to be happy, and for the first time in my life, I really see my Higher Powers presence in my life.

During the first 4 months of my sentence, I was not allowed to attend AA meetings, but when I arrived here at Collins, I found out that AA meetings are held 4 days a week! These AA meetings are truly recovery based. Today I am the Sec/Tres of the "New Reformers Group", here at Collins. I've seen our group grow to over 20 members in the last 6 months. We share "our experience, strength and hope" at our inside meetings 4 times a week. I see the miracle of recovery not only in my life, but in the lives of others as well. Although I'm in prison, God has blessed me with a new way of life. I now belong to the fellowship of AA, I am one of you, and it feels great, not be alone.

In closing, I'd like to invite all of you to come share your 'Experience, Strength and hope", with us! You are most welcome any time.

SPONSORSHIP

Sponsorship is a fundamentally satisfying, and necessary part of this program. I have had two sponsors in my 19 years of sobriety. One has passed away, and I still have the other one.

I don't know what I would have done without my sponsor. I have called her on numerous occasions with simple and sometimes inconsequential questions, but to me they were very important at the time. She has always been ready to answer questions in her calm and quiet way.

Sometimes the quiet would annoy me, but not anymore. I realize that we are all in the same boat, but we don't all row the same.

Whenever I have felt threatened by John Barleycom, I called my sponsor and she reassured me



that whatever I am doing is just fine. I, at this precise time in my life, do not feel the need to call her as often. But when I do, I still have the same warm and comfortable feeling of talking to a very good friend.

A sponsor, I feel, is someone you should talk with when you have a very intimate problem that you don't want aired at a meeting. I have yet to hear anything I have discussed with my sponsor come back to me. That is why it is so important to be selective when picking a person or persons, to be your sponsor. It is not

something one takes lightly. Being a recovering alcoholic is an ongoing affair, and you need to have someone you trust implicitly to take this trip with you.

BONDAGE OF BAD HABITS?

Anyone who has ever "seen red" or been too angry to care what they said, or who they hurt, knows the bondage of character defects. Fear compels a man to pretend he is unmoved by a beautiful sunset, pride keeps a woman from saying "I'm sorry" and saving a relationship. The 12 & 12 says that instincts in collision cause many of our problems, and that character defects are instincts run wild.

Most people would prefer not to suffer the emotional swings and the repercussions caused by these defects, and would remove them if they could. Some have tried and found they could not. (sound familiar?) To get relief from alcoholism, we had to surrender, and ask for help from a Higher Power. So it is with our shortcomings. The Seventh Step states, "Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings." I was asked by a sponsee some years ago how he could tell if God had removed his shortcomings, as he had requested. I replied, "just ask, and act as if He has!" I can't remove my shortcomings, and they certainly still exist, but their hold on me is lessened as I continue on AA's path, believing in a Power Greater than myself.

ANONYMITY AND FREEDOM

The problem with taking credit for something is that you also have to take the blame if (or when) it blows up. Awareness of this aspect of responsibility tends to limit the appeal of the more short-lived fame and glory. So it goes sometimes in AA, when an enthusiastic AA gathers sponsees by the score. At first, all goes well, and then some get drunk. If the sponsor has been taking credit for their sobriety, he may feel as though he's responsible for their relapse. In either case, his ego has overestimated his power. A little perspective as to Who's really in charge always helps.


The original idea of anonymity stemmed from a feeling of shame about alcoholism, as well as a fear of being overwhelmed by appeals following the publication of the Big Book. Anonymity was later found to be a powerful spiritual principle which allows us to drop our demanding ego and need for attention, in order to help our fellow sufferers, and be a part of AA.

When I help someone without thought of reward, without having to share about my virtue, I am anonymous. In anonymity, I give up my need to distinguish from you, and I am free to explore what is same about us. When I am anonymous, I get relief of bondage of self.


