





OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE





"AA and it's principles are teaching me to accept life on life's terms. I am no longer afraid to admit that I am an alcoholic."



THE MEANING OF THE SERENITY PRAYER



How many of us say the Serenity Prayer at the start of the meeting, then promptly forget it? It is the most powerful short prayer in the world. Nothing can replace the Lords Prayer, of course, but the few words of the Serenity Prayer pack a lot of power and meaning.

- **God.** When we say this word, we admit there is a Higher Power.
- **Grant.** We are admitting this Higher Power can bestow or give.
- **Me.** We are asking something for ourselves and it is not wrong to ask for betterment of yourself.
- **Serenity.** We ask for calmness, composure and peace so we can think straight.
- **Accept.** We resign ourselves to conditions as they are right now.
- **Thing I Cannot Change.** Until we gain the courage to change parts of our lives we don't like, we must accept them, and not grudgingly.
- **Courage.** A quality of spirit needed to face conditions without flinching.
- **Change.** We are asking for things to be different.
- **Things I can.** Asking for the ability to make the right decisions.
- **Wisdom.** Asking for the ability to form sound judgments.
- **To know.** We want to understand clearly a truth or fact.
- **The Difference.** We want to see things differently in our lives so that there can be some distinction. We need to sense a definite value in sobriety over drunkenness if we are to stay sober.

Bill W's wife, Lois passed away October 5th, 1988, at the age of 97 1/2. A memorial service arranged by the Al-Anon Family Group Headquarters was held at the

marble Collegiate Church in New York, made famous by the ministry of Norman Vincent Peal, who knew and admired both Bill and Lois, and Alcoholics Anonymous."



The obituary jumped out at me: "Chet S. of South Buffalo passed away at age 83 in a retirement home." The last time I had seen Chet I was having my hair cut at Frank the Barbers'. Chet stumbled in the door and fell on his knees. To my last recollection, it was mid-60's. Chet was infamous to bartenders on Seneca Street for having an insatiable thirst and very little money and would do just about anything for a drink.

My in-laws lived about four doors away from him, and it was not unusual for him to bum a buck from my father-in-law on his way to work. Rumor had it that Chet drank himself into an early retirement from a County job of some importance and was considered a hopeless drunk.

Frank gave him fifty cents and blessed himself as he hustled Chet out the door. Since I became divorced in 1971, I don't recall seeing Chet again. In the meantime, my father-in-law and many other alkie have died, some sober, some not. But Chet out-lived them all.

The 'obit' announced that Chet had "achieved recovery" in 1974. I would bet a lot of money that Chet had died a long time ago. What a wonderful Program.

In carrying the message of Alcoholics Anonymous we must remember the Third Tradition, 'The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking'. To quote the old-timers, "what would the Master do in this case?"

In my mind, do I prejudge some new AA members as 'losers?' Is there some kind of alcoholic that I don't want at my home group? Do I set myself up as a judge of whether a newcomer is sincere or phony? Do I let language, religion (or lack of it) race, education, age, or any other such things interfere with my trying to carry the message?

Am I over-impressed by some celebrity, doctor, clergyman, or lawyer? Or can I just treat the new member simply and naturally as one more sick human being, like the rest of us?

When someone shows up at an AA meeting seeking information or help (even if he or she hasn't asked for it out loud), does it really matter what they do for a living, where they live, and what their domestic situations are? We should not discuss their other problems, or whether or not they have been in AA before. We need to concentrate on the still sick and suffering alcoholic.

I believe we should be kind to all people who suffer from the other diseases but remind them at AA tables to speak only of their problem as related to Alcoholism! We must remember that some people are sicker than others!

We cannot live in the problem, we must live in the solution. We must practice the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions of AA, if we are to recover. The Big Book says that I am a recovered Alcoholic and I believe this.

EXPERIENCE, STRENGTH AND HOPE

Step Three: "Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him." How many of us stumbled over that one? Everyone usually goes for the first part of this step, so I would like to explain to you the God of my understanding. Let me

reiterate, God, as I understood Him. The God I grew up with, the Catholic God of long ago, the Catholic private school I attended, and the Catholic Nuns who taught me about the God of their understanding.

The way I understood it then, God was a punishing, mean, hateful, and did not want me to succeed God. My God-Fearing mother was respected in the church, but behind closed doors, she beat the devil out of us, (my siblings and I.) Those God-Fearing nuns, took me into the furnace room, where the fires in the hot water boiler were banked high, and that frightened me. They told me to get used to it, because I was going to hell! I did go to hell, the hell of my active alcoholism for many years.

Through the steps of AA, I have found a God of my understanding, who knows and loves me. He is the one who I turned my will and my life over to, He always had it, I finally acknowledged it.

Very early in my sobriety, I heard and read that there would come a time when nothing would stand between me and a drink, except a Higher Power.

One of the things that enabled my drinking was, my drive to exceed, not a lot changed in my drying out. I got a job with a deadline, which some people thought was impossible to meet. I beat the original time by a week! As I stood alone in the company kitchen, patting myself on the back for

doing such a good job, I opened the 'fridge' and reached for a beer! As my hands hit that bottle, I stopped, completely confused, stepped away, got my coat and went home. It took me several days to understand just what happened that night. It finally dawned on me, that God was in my life all along, sitting right on my shoulder and in my heart.

Tradition Three (Long Form): " Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Nor ought A.A. membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation." What does this mean to me? Well, I was a hard core, falling down, puking, yukkey, no morals drunk. I looked everywhere, read all the books, tried everything to figure out what was wrong with me. Not until I joined AA, did I find out that I was an alcoholic!

One sickness; alcoholism, one hope; Alcoholics Anonymous. There is a great need to keep it simple in this Program, so others like myself can find sobriety. Thank you, God of my understanding.
