Attitude

"...The longer I live, the more I realize the impact of attitude on life. Attitude, to me, is more important than facts. It is more than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than successes, than what other people think or say or do. It is more important than appearance, giftedness or skill. It will make or break a company...a church...a home. The remarkable thing is we have a choice every day regarding the attitude we will embrace for the day. We cannot change our past...we cannot change the fact that people will act in a certain way. We cannot change the inevitable. The only thing we can do is play on the one thing we have, and that is our attitude...I am convinced that life is 10% what happens to me and 90% haw I react to it. And so it is with you... we are in charge of our attitudes..."

Self-support: The Seventh:Tradition

There are no dues or fees for membership in A.A., but we do have expenses. In keeping with Seventh Tradition a group may "pass the basket" in order to cover expenses such as rent, refreshments, A.A. Conference-approved books, pamphlets, and meeting lists, and contributions to services provided by the local intergroup (central office), district and area, and the General Service Office of A.A. worldwide. A.A. members are free to contribute whatever they wish, up to a maximum of \$2,000 each in a given year.

The A.A. Home Group

"Traditionally, most A.A. members through the years have found it important to belong to one group which they call 'Home Group.' This is the group where the accept responsibilities and try to sustain friendships. And although all AA members are usually welcome at all groups and feel at home at ant of these meetings, the concept of the 'Home Group' has still remained the strongest bond between the AA member and the Fellowship." (from *The A.A. Service Manual*).

With the membership comes the right to vote upon issues that might affect the group and might affect AA as a whole – a process that forms the very cornerstone of AA's service structure. As with all group-conscience matters, each AA member has one vote; and this ideally, is voiced through the home group.

Over the years, the very essence of AA strength has remained with the home group, which, for many members, becomes their extended family. Once isolated by their drinking, find in the home group a solid, contributing support system, friends and, very often, a sponsor. They also learn firsthand, through group's working, how to place "principles before personalities" in the interest of carrying the AA message.

Talking about her own group, a member says: Part of my commitment is to show up at my home-group meetings, greet newcomers at the door, and be available to them – not only for them but for me. My fellow group members are the people who know me, listen to me, and steer me straight when I am off in left field. They give me their experience, strength, and AA love, enabling me to "pass it on" to the alcoholic who still suffers."

What is an A.A. group?

As the long form of Tradition Three clearly states, "Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought AA membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an AA group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation. Further clarification of an AA group may be found in Warranty Six, Twelfth Concept:

- "no penalties to be inflicted for nonconformity to AA principles;
- no fees or dues to be levied voluntary contributions only;
- no member to be expelled from AA membership always to be the choice of the individual;
- each AA group to conduct it internal affairs as it wishes it being merely requested to abstain
 from acts that might injure AA as a whole; and finally
- that any group of alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an AA group provided that, as a group, they have no other purpose or affiliation

Some AA's come together as specialized groups - for men, women, young people, doctors, gays, and others. If the members are all al coholics, and if they open the doors to all alcoholics who seek help, regardless of profession, gender, or other distinctions, and meet all the other aspects defining an AA group, they may call themselves an AA group.

AA groups are encouraged to register at the G.S.O., as well as with their area, district, intergroup, or central office

The Importance of Anonymity

Tradition Twelve: Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

What is the purpose of anonymity in AA? Why is it often referred to as the greatest single protection the Fellowship has to assure its continued existence and growth?

At the level of press, radio, and film, anonymity stresses equality in AA of all its members. It puts the brake on our easily inflatable egos, our misplaced conviction that violating our anonymity will help someone, and our desire for personal recognition or control. Most importantly, the Anonymity Tradition reminds us that it is the AA message, not the messenger that is important.

At the personal level, anonymity assures privacy for all members, a safeguard often of special significance to newcomers who may hesitate to seek help in AA. If they have any reason to believe their alcoholism may be exposed publicly.

In theory, the anonymity principle seems clear, but putting it into effect is not always easy. Following are some general guidelines culled from AA experience that may be helpful.

Maintaining anonymity at the public level:

When appearing on radio, TV, or films as AA members, we refrain from showing our faces or revealing our last names. In printed articles, we are identified by our first name and last initials only.

We use our first names and last initials only when speaking as AA members at non-AA meetings. (See the pamphlet "Speaking at non-AA Meetings")

We do not put AA on envelopes sent through the mails, not even on correspondence directed to AA entities. On material to be posted at on AA bulletin boards and printed on AA programs that the public may see, we omit last names and identifying titles of all members.

Understanding anonymity at the AA group level:

We may use last names within our group. At the same time, we respect the right of other members to maintain their own anonymity however they wish, and as closely as they wish. Some groups keep a list of names and telephone numbers volunteered by their members, and may provide phone lists - but for the eyes of the group members only.

We repeat no one's personal sharing made in AA meetings. The word "anonymous" in our name is a promise of privacy. Besides, the only story of recovery we can truly share is our own.

In our personal relationships with non-alcoholics – and with those we think might have a problem with alcohol – we may feel free to say that we are recovering alcoholics (without divulging the names of other AA members), although discretion is recommended. Here our openness may help carry the message.

We refrain from videotaping that special AA talk or meeting which might receive exposure at the public level. And, as the 1980 General Service Conference recommended, it is wiser that talks by AA members be given in person, in view of the temptation when videotaping to place personalities before principles and thus encourage the development of a "star" system in Alcoholics Anonymous.

I've heard faith defined as "being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." I believe it's a gift from God, and free to anyone who asks. Just remember to receive the gift!

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- 1) ENVELOPE SYSTEM: Cindy N. of Sunrise Court gave the report. For March of 2001, \$336.00 was collected. A comparison of the last three years is listed below:
