From the Doctor's Opinion, Alcoholics Anonymous, pg xxvi, Dr. Silkworth writes:

"We believe and so suggested a few years ago, that the action of alcohol on these chronic alcoholics is a manifestation of an allergy; that the phenomenon of craving is limited to this class and never occurs in the average temperate drinker. These allergic types can never safely use alcohol in any form at all; and once having found they cannot break it, once having lost their self-confidence, their reliance upon things human, their problems pile up on them and become astonishingly difficult to solve. Frothy emotional appeal seldom suffices. The message, which can interest and hold these alcoholic people must have depth and weight. In nearly all cases, their ideals must be grounded in a power greater than themselves, if they are to re-create their lives."

Please deliver us from the so-called pseudo-intellectuals and biochemists who would have us believe that bad metabolism, ethnic origins or our evil past was the cause of our alcoholism. I learned that I was allergic to alcohol. A simple no-nonsense approach to the resolution of my problem was to stay away from the source of that allergy. I fashioned many elaborate disguises for my disease. It was no act of heroism that brought me to AA, but rather a simple plea for help from the maddening disease of alcoholism. I sought a power greater than myself.

Before I arrived at the doors of AA, I believed in nothing but my own thoughts. At one meeting an old-timer asked me a question... "When your back was against the wall and you had nowhere to go for help, did you ever say, 'God help me, I'll never do this again!'" That was the moment of truth; I said that many times! I now had to face the fact that I did believe in a power greater than myself, I finally arrived.

The road to spirituality was open now. I had something to believe in. A simple prayer in the morning starts my day: "Teach me today, to better do your will...not mine." And in the evening a simple thank you is all that is needed. The 'Big Book' on page 85 tells us; *what we have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities. 'How best can I serve Thee? – Thy will (not mine) be done.'* The spiritual life is not a theory. We have to live it.

God brought me to AA, and AA in turn showed me a way to believe in Him. Regular attendance at meetings is a must for me, but meetings alone cannot keep me sober, I need daily guidance from a power greater than myself. Service work is important, not only does it keep me sober, but it also sends a message to the newcomer, to keep it we must give it away, or at least try.

Step Five: "Admitted to God, ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

If we skip this vital step, we may not overcome drinking. We must be entirely honest with somebody if we expect to live long or happily in this world. ...We search our acquaintance for a close-mouthed, understanding friend.

We pocket our pride and go to it, illuminating every twist of character, every dark cranny of the past. Once we have taken this step, withholding nothing, we are delighted. We can look the world in the eye. We can be alone at perfect peace and ease. Our fears fall from us. We begin to feel the nearness of our Creator. We may have had certain spiritual beliefs, but now we begin to have a spiritual experience. The feeling that the drink problem has disappeared will often come strongly. We feel we are on a Broad Highway, walking hand in hand with the Spirit of the Universe.

Until we actually sit down and talk aloud about what we have so long hidden, our willingness to clean house is still largely theoretical. The only thing that matters is that he is an alcoholic who has found a key to sobriety. These legacies of suffering and of recovery are easily passed among alcoholics, one to the other. This is our gift from God, and its bestowal upon others like us is the one aim that today animates AA's all around the globe.

It is the great paradox of AA that we know we can seldom keep the precious gift of sobriety unless we give it away. For us, if we neglect those who are still sick, there is unremitting danger to our own lives and sanity. Under these compulsions of self-preservation, duty, and love, it is not strange that our Society has concluded that it has but one high mission - to carry the AA message to those who don't know there's a way out.

Heard at a meeting:

- Recovery doesn't come to me; *I have to go get it.*
- Our hearts have only one door and the handle is on the inside. Only we can open it.
- Say a prayer, go to a meeting, *you will be contacted.*

Each day is God's gift to us; we can reject it or we can thank Him by showing how much we appreciate it. I am never promised a tomorrow; all any of us have is today. Everyday I try to repay in some way all that has been given so freely to me. A smile or a touch is often all that's needed to brighten someone's day.

We in Alcoholics Anonymous, have the power and the choice to live each day to its fullest - simply by learning to live one day at a time.

Displayed Archives at Helping Hand Group in Wheatfield with four members: Ben W., Frank M., Cheryl K., and yours truly. Good speakers, good food, and good meeting. We have two tentative dates for Archives display, and one for Springville, Tuesday night 8:00 June 25th. CPC COMMITTEE: No Report

PIC COMMITTEE: Adolph I reported that he has started to gather people and ideas.

RECAP:

FINANCIAL REPORT: Mel L. of Renewal Group stated that from the reported income for Feb., Mar., April there are resources coming in and he took exception to what he felt was implied slur toward Groups that don't contribute to Central Office at this time. He stated that his group is unable to at this time but he contributes also through other meetings he attends and they may have the resources to contribute.

OLD BUSINESS: REWORDING OF GUIDELINES: Question were brought up whether there was a real need for wording changes in the old guidelines of self-support, regarding the Buffalo Fall Convention. Group Rep's were to take this information back to their groups for feedback and input. Cookie L. had a question regarding how the original question arose. Scott answered that it began in District #4. John H. had question about group conscious decision to send check to Coffee Fund. Scott explained that he and the Steering Committee felt the change was necessary to make the Convention Committee responsible to raise their own Coffee Fund money. He also stated that this will not affect this fall's Convention, but will clarify it for the future. If a group wants to send money to the coffee fund they should feel free to do so. Charmaine stated that they wanted a way to answer the question of coffee funding, and we need a way to do this. Several groups said that they had taken it to their groups and supported the change, but after hearing the concerns they would have to take it back. Adolph and several others suggested changing the wording of the proposed new guideline to eliminate any arbitrary words, such as non-participants, and this would require it being sent back to all groups for review. Also if groups sent money to the coffee fund it must be used for that solely or sent back, and that we do not solicit contributions.

ATTENDANCE/ REGISTRATION FEES: Another question was raised concerning the authority to allow some to attend the Convention even if they lack funds. It was explained that it has always been the practice, the historical way to allow the Chairperson or designated other to make these decisions, which usually concern Treatment facilities, Halfway Houses or other similar institutions. Adolph stated that if the Chairperson or other did not have this discretion the request would have to go back to the committee and that could take forever. This would put it in the guidelines for all.

LENGTH OF SERVICE: Discussion was entertained about changing length of terms for officers of Central Committee. Mel L., Renewal Group said, on the surface it sounds great, but there is a downside. Currently the Chairman serves one year as co-chair, then if the change is made two years as chairman which may turn into 3 or 4 years. It could become 'my central committee'. Another point is that I have previously served on Central Committee. We always had a problem getting people to serve. Now we are asking them to serve longer. It's going to get worse getting qualified people for Chairperson and other positions. Cookie asked about length of service for recording secretary. Scott answered that the recording secretary does only that and is not involved with other committees or duties. The recording Secretary took exception to this and stated that she also makes sense of all of this for the benefit of everyone. Charmaine D. responded to Mel's concern and said we are governed by a Higher Power and if ego raises it's head the steering Committee, composed of strong individuals will speak up. The Central Committee was informed that an explanation of the new terms would go out to the groups.
