From the Doctor's Opinion, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, pg xxvi, Dr. Silkworth writes:

"We believe and so suggested a few years ago, that the action of alcohol on these chronic alcoholics is a manifestation of an allergy; that the phenomenon of craving is limited to this class and never occurs in the average temperate drinker. These allergic types can never safely use alcohol in any form at all; and once having found they cannot break it, once having lost their self-confidence, their reliance upon things human, their problems pile up on them and become astonishingly difficult to solve. Frothy emotional appeal seldom suffices. The message, which can interest and hold these alcoholic people must have depth and weight. In nearly all cases, their ideals must be grounded in a power greater than themselves, if they are to re-create their lives."

Please deliver us from the so-called pseudo-intellectuals and biochemists who would have us believe that bad metabolism, ethnic origins or our evil past was the cause of our alcoholism. I learned that I was allergic to alcohol. A simple no-nonsense approach to the resolution of my problem was to stay away from the source of that allergy. I fashioned many elaborate disguises for my disease. It was no act of heroism that brought me to AA, but rather a simple plea for help from the maddening disease of alcoholism. I sought a power greater than myself.

Before I arrived at the doors of AA, I believed in nothing but my own thoughts. At one meeting an old-timer asked me a question... "When your back was against the wall and you had nowhere to go for help, did you ever say, 'God help me, I'll never do this again!'" That was the moment of truth; I said that many times! I now had to face the fact that I did believe in a power greater than myself, I finally arrived.

The road to spirituality was open now. I had something to believe in. A simple prayer in the morning starts my day: "Teach me today, to better do your will...not mine." And in the evening a simple thank you is all that is needed. The 'Big Book' on page 85 tells us; *what we have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities. 'How best can I serve Thee? – Thy will (not mine) be done.'* The spiritual life is not a theory. We have to live it.

God brought me to AA, and AA in turn showed me a way to believe in Him. Regular attendance at meetings is a must for me, but meetings alone cannot keep me sober, I need daily guidance from a power greater than myself. Service work is important, not only does it keep me sober, but it also sends a message to the newcomer, to keep it we must give it away, or at least try.

The immediate object of our quest is sobriety - freedom from alcohol and from all its baleful consequences. Without the freedom, we have nothing at all.

Paradoxically, though, we can achieve no liberation from the alcohol obsession until we become willing to deal with those character defects which have landed us in that helpless condition. In this freedom quest, we are always given three choices.

A rebellious refusal to work upon our glaring defects can be an almost certain ticket to destruction. Or, perhaps for a time, we can stay sober with a minimum of self-improvement and settle ourselves into a comfortable but often dangerous mediocrity. Or, finally, we can continuously try hard for those sterling qualities that can add up to fitness of spirit and action - true and lasting freedom under God.

Since most of us are born with an abundance of natural desires, it isn't strange that we often let these far exceed their intended purpose. When they drive us blindly, or we willfully demand that they supply us with more satisfactions or pleasures than are possible or due us, that is the point at which we depart from the degree of perfection that God wishes for us here on earth. That is the measure of our character defects, or, if you wish, our sins.

If we ask, God will certainly forgive us our derelictions. But in no case does He render us white as snow and keep us that way without our cooperation. That is something we are supposed to be willing to work toward ourselves. He asks only that we try as best we know how to make progress in the building of character.

So Step Six is AA's way of stating the best possible attitude one can take in order to make a beginning on this lifetime job. This does not mean that we expect all our character defects to be lifted out of us as the drive to drink was. A few of them may be, but with most of them we shall have to be content with patient improvement. The key words "entirely ready" underline the fact that we want to aim at the very best we know or can learn.

Tradition Five: "Each group has but one primary purpose - to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers."

Better to do one thing well than many badly. The life of our Fellowship depends on this principle. The ability of each AA to identify himself with and bring recovery to the newcomer is a gift from God ... passing on this gift to others is our one aim. Sobriety can't be kept unless it is given away.

.... Firmly bound by obligation are the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, who have demonstrated that they can help problem drinkers as others seldom can. The unique ability of each AA to identify himself with, and bring recovery to the newcomer in no way depends upon his learning, eloquence, or any special individual skills. The only thing that matters is that he is an alcoholic who has found a key to sobriety. These legacies of suffering and of recovery are easily passed among alcoholics, one to the other. This is our gift from God, and its bestowal upon others like us is the one aim that today animates AA's all around the globe.

It is the great paradox of AA that we know we can seldom keep the precious gift of sobriety unless we give it away. For us, if we neglect those who are still sick, there is unremitting danger to our own lives and sanity. Under these compulsions of self-preservation, duty, and love, it is not strange that our Society has concluded that it has but one high mission - to carry the AA message to those who don't know there's a way out.

Heard at a meeting:

- Recovery doesn't come to me; *I have to go get it.*
- Our hearts have only one door and the handle is on the inside. Only we can open it.
- Say a prayer, go to a meeting, *you will be contacted.*

Each day is God's gift to us; we can reject it or we can thank Him by showing how much we appreciate it. I am never promised a tomorrow; all any of us have is today. Everyday I try to repay in some way all that has been given so freely to me. A smile or a touch is often all that's needed to brighten someone's day.

We in Alcoholic's Anonymous, have the power and the choice to live each day to its fullest - simply by learning to live one day at a time.

Twisted Fate

Life can seem quite twisted, unfair, and even unbearable. This I know as well as anybody. You see I am suffering from the worst pain known to man. No, it is not a migraine headache – I suffered through those as a child. I would gladly exchange what ails me now for that incredibly strong lightning bolt racing through my head. True, I could not move a muscle for fear of horrendous pain, and vomiting, yet, this to is no match for the pain I suffer now.

Maybe a broken back? No, sorry, I did that six months ago. Although it was by no means fun – it hurt quite a bit actually, still does. I would gladly break it again, my back, my arms, and my legs if only it would stop this unbearable suffering.

What is this incredible pain, you ask? What could possibly hurt me so much?

Well I will tell you, it can only be heartache!

Yes emotional pain, losing someone you love more than you love yourself, more than life itself. A pain that hurts so bad it brings you to the brink of suicide. It hurts so bad emotionally that you break out in tears at anytime (like I am now) for no apparent reason. It hurts you physically in that you can't eat, can't sleep and the pain in your stomach gets so tight you think you will fall over. It is in the headaches, and dizzy spells. Heartache also hurts you emotionally in that misery engulfs you like a black cloud, leaving you nowhere to turn.

Mentally I think it hurts you the worst, with the thoughts of suicide, and dark, morbid painful, negative, and scrambled thinking.

So what do you do? Where do you turn? I believe the one area of self that is not hurt by heartache is spirit. What you do is turn to God.

I am not a preacher, just a man with a broken heart. I am not talking about religion; religion is only a guide, not the vacation spot or the paradise I am speaking of. I am talking about spirituality. I am talking about my broken heart! That is the only place you will ever come to truly find God (in your own heart) and all by yourself. Religion can lead you to the water of everlasting life, to the gateway of peace, and joy; however, it is you who ultimately must walk through. The doorway to truth is through your own heart that is where you find love, truth, and God.

Unfortunately for me believing this to be so doesn't take my pain away. I believe that a broken heart will heal stronger than it was, just like broken bone, and just like bone only time can heal it. So I wrap my heart in a cast of prayer, and meditation, then wait. I embrace the pain as a gift. If we must divide, if there must be a backside to every coin; then that means if I can hurt this bad, suffer this much, then I must also have the potential to love, to feel joy, and happiness at least equal to this pain I feel now. That is a glorious thing.

In closing consider this: The strongest sword, the hardest steel, is forged in the hottest flame. Remember that, and remember this – you are not alone. We are all God's children, and we all go through the forge of pain, and suffering. One way or another, it only makes us stronger.

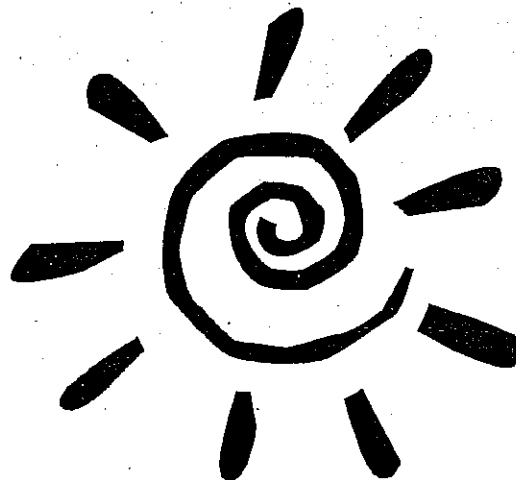
