THE AA GROUP

In our area we have over three hundred AA meetings listed in our schedule. How many of these AA meetings are run by an AA group? The question now becomes, what is an AA group, and what are its responsibilities? First let's explore what an AA group doesn't do. An AA group does not solicit members, engage in sponsor research, keep attendance records, offer religious services, or try to control its members. It does not provide counseling or housing nor does it offer medical or psychological prognoses.

AA groups decide the type of meeting ... open, closed, beginners, discussion, Big Book Study or Step meeting. The AA group then is the host to that meeting, providing moderators for tables, introducing topics as they relate to alcoholism, eliminating the time worn statement, 'pick your own moderator!' The AA group schedules regular business meetings where members decide by a group conscience vote and assign or volunteer to handle the jobs necessary to keep the group running smooth. Coffee maker, Greater, Treasurer, Chairperson, GSA Rep, Central Committee Rep or Speaker Seeker are just a few of the jobs necessary to the survival and effectiveness of the group. The Central Office, GSA, Treatment and Correctional facilities also need our support.

Do Groups have literature for the newcomer? Are new members greeted with a smile and a handshake? Does your home group have a treasurer and a bank account? Are members informed about the financial stability of the group? Does the treasurer present a written account of all financial transactions? Are job assignments rotated on a regular basis so everyone has a chance to serve? Some AA groups resemble a one-man band, where one or two members control the entire group; these members hold multiple jobs excluding others from the joy of serving.

If this sounds like your home group, changes need to be made. An AA group is all about sharing the everyday jobs that make it an AA group! The primary purpose of an AA group is to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. The AA group serves as a source of personal experience and on going support system for the recovering alcoholic. AA groups are non-professional, self-supporting, non-denominational, multi-racial, apolitical, and the only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking.

Let us remember that the AA group is usually the first contact the newcomer has with AA. How they are treated and what they hear could affect them in a positive or negative way. The AA group is the very lifeblood for the alcoholic who still suffers.

The message at an AA group should not be "why my cat died" or "my counselor doesn't understand me" it should give the newcomer hope and understanding by those of us who have embraced the AA program of recovery and have recovered from that hopeless state of mind and body called Alcoholism.

Step Eleven ~ Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God, *as we understood Him*, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

Working Step Eleven

THERE are different ways to improve "our conscious contact with God as we understand Him." Some of us take a religious way by going to church, reading the Bible and other religious literature, along with the Big Book and other AA literature. Some of us take the spiritual way, confining ourselves to the literature of AA alone. Either way is as good as the other, depending on the effort we put into it. I find the spiritual way works best for me.

When I go to bed each night, I ask myself if during the day I have been resentful, selfish, dishonest or afraid? Have I tried to help people instead of hurting them? Have I discussed problems that arose, with other people as I should, or have I kept them to myself? Have I been able to control my temper? After making my day's review, I ask God's forgiveness for the things I did wrong, and ask Him that they do not occur again. Then I thank Him for keeping me and other alcoholics sober for the past twenty-four hours.

When I get up each morning, I thank God for a restful night, and ask for guidance throughout the day. And that He will help keep me, and other alcoholics, from taking that first drink. I ask that He keep my thinking on the correct course, away from self-pity, dishonesty or self-seeking motives.

If sometimes during the day, I lose control of my temper or proper thinking, I get away from everyone as soon as possible. I sit somewhere alone, smoke a cigarette and relax. I ask God to help me overcome whatever the trouble may be.

When I have a few spare minutes, I spend them meditating, and asking for guidance, not only for myself, but for all alcoholics.

I carry our "Just for Today" and the "Daily Moral Inventory" pamphlets with me at all times, and refer to them often during the day.

This is the way that I work Step Eleven.

Prayer is when we talk to God and meditation is when we sit quietly and listen for His answer.

Tradition Eleven ~ Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.

Ever notice that most of the steps and traditions are in two parts? Tradition Eleven is one of those. "Our Public Relations Policy" is two-fold, "attraction rather than promotion" & "personal anonymity."

My understanding of the first part of tradition eleven is that we do not recruit drunks from under bridges or on street corners. We do not go into bars and drag people off barstools. If we run into someone we used to sit next to in the bars they will most likely ask us 'what happened to you?' & 'where have we been?' They have probably noticed our improved appearance and *maybe even* our absence from the bar. Now is the time to tell them about our involvement in AA. If they are not ready to listen at least the seed has been planted and when they are ready they will know who to call. Our family may want to tell someone about our recovery - and why not? They have probably shared the misery we caused them and their inability to curb our drinking. When my father was in the hospital he told all the nurses my name and then that I "used to have a problem with booze & drugs but I found God & AA and was doing great now." At first I was embarrassed by this, but soon realized he was proud of me! (But that is another story!)

Personally I did not know anyone who was in AA, but I had heard of AA. I knew I had a drinking problem and couldn't seem to stop, or even control, my drinking no matter how hard I tried. I thought Alcoholics Anonymous could teach me to drink like a lady! When you told me "We just don't drink TODAY" I thought I could handle that - One Day At A Time. My life was totally unmanageable, but it never occurred to me that drinking had anything to do with it! Never, that is until I asked for help.

The second part of this tradition, personal anonymity, well sometimes we tend to get carried away with that! Tradition Eleven is very specific - personal anonymity is AT the press, radio & film level - not above it - nor below it. How can we attract any one if we take this anonymity thing too far? The Sunday morning speaker at the 2003 Founders Day in Akron, OH was a well-known actor, singer, & songwriter he explained this tradition very well:

"My name is Paul W _____ and I'm a recovering alcoholic. You can print that till the day I die and keep on printin' it. What I would ask is that you continue a record that I am proud of. For thirteen years you've never seen my name printed next to the name of Alcoholics Anonymous so what I would ask of anybody listening to the tape anybody in the audience who's with the press *please* feel free to talk about my recovery ... I think anytime anybody talks openly about their recovery we take a little bit of the stigma of alcoholism off the disease. But *please* honor our tradition because you know (pause) and let me explain to you very simply why we have that tradition. If Paulie W _____ goes out and gets drunk Wednesday and you printed that I'm a member of Alcoholics Anonymous somebody's gonna go: 'Well I thought he's in that AA, that AA must not work.' that AA works just fine! If Paulie W _____ gets drunk it's because Paulie W _____ did not work a perfect first step."

That about sums it up for me!

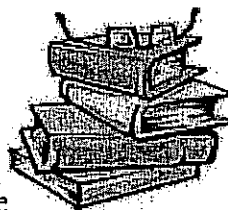
Our archives now have a permanent home in our new Central Office. No more storing in basements, storerooms, and trunks of cars, our archives are now in a climate controlled room with an air purifier used exclusively for the preservation of these documents. Our archives bring to life the men and women of AA in our area, the pioneers of our fellowship who steadfastly brought AA through tough times and made AA what it is today – the life's blood of recovery for the alcoholic. The Archives are readily available to any group at any time for anniversaries, parties or special events. A one-month notice is needed to have the exhibit at your home group.

An AA member on the archives committee donated a computer. Some minor repairs to the computer are needed to make it usable. Also, the Central Office rents us the room at a cost of \$50.00 per month. We are self supporting by our own contributions (Tradition 7) but the cost of maintaining and improving the quality of our archives display is rising and more support is needed.

In the spirit of AA we ask for donations so that we may continue our work of preserving our past. We are grateful for the support received to enhance our archives exhibit, but we need continued support to sustain the quality and the maintenance of our display.



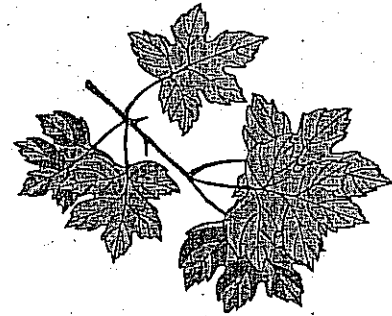

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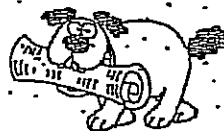
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
