OCTOBER TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

STEP10: "Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

- When we were wrong? What if I am not wrong?

"We have found that justified anger ought to be left to those better qualified to handle it."... "Anger, that occasional luxury of more balanced people, could keep us on an emotional jag indefinitely." (pg 90 – 12x12)

- Am I now one of those emotionally stable folks who can differentiate between justified and unjustified anger and nurse grudges without affecting my spiritual condition?
- Have I developed the quality of self-restraint, or, do I go through the day saying whatever is on my mind ...telling it like it is? Who is affected by my behavior?

"This thought brings us to *Step Ten*, which suggests we continue to take personal inventory and continue to set right any new mistakes as we go along." (pg 84 – Alcoholics Anonymous)

- Doesn't this suggest that we will indeed make new mistakes?
- Have I entered the world of the spirit? How would I (do I) know that?

"Our next function is to grow in understanding and effectiveness. This is not an overnight matter. It should continue for our lifetime." (pg 84 – Alcoholics Anonymous)

- Have I learned from my mistakes and has that helped me to understand others who are as imperfect as I?
- As I have come to understand my shortcomings, has this made me more effective in helping others?
- Do I resolutely turn my thoughts to someone I can help when I am troubled by selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear?
- Is love and tolerance of others my code?

"And we have ceased fighting anything or anyone-even alcohol. For by this time sanity will have returned." (pg 84 – Alcoholics Anonymous)

- Do I react sanely and normally? Is the second step realized in the working of the tenth step?
- Am I seldom interested in liquor? Do I still have to avoid temptation? Have I been placed in a position of neutrality? If I am in a position of neutrality is it a result of my being diligent or does it come from a Power greater than me that I do, or do not, understand?
- Has the problem been removed? How do I know this?

"Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities." (pg 85- Alcoholics Anonymous)

- **What are the thoughts that must go with me constantly?**
- **Do I choose not to drink or have I been granted a daily reprieve?**
- **Is that reprieve contingent on anything?**

"For we can neither think nor act to good purpose until the habit of self-restraint has become automatic."(pg 91- 12x12)

- **Have I been driven blindly by my own prideful accomplishments?**
- **Am I suffering from the pains of growing up? Who else is suffering from the pains of my growing up?**
- **Big shot, little shot, one shot and your all shot.**
- **Why is pain the touchstone of all spiritual growth?**

"Learning daily to spot, admit, and correct these flaws is the essence of character-building and good living." (pg 95- 12x12)

Tradition 10: "Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy."

Tradition 10 (Long Form): "No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues- particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever.

"As by some deep instinct, we A.A.'s have known from the very beginning that we must never, no matter what the provocation, publicly take sides in any fight, even a worthy one." (pg 176- 12x12)

"...we do not enter into public controversy, because we know that our Society will perish if it does." (pg 177- 12x12)

- **Whatever happened to the Oxford Groups? What caused A.A. to break off from them? Where are they now?**
- **What happened to the Washingtonians?**
- **Are there any public causes that individual A.A. members are welcome to participate in as citizens of the world that are distinctly separate from A.A. and have been allowed to seep into our AA culture?**

 2. **Religion?**
 3. **Drunk driving reform?**
 4. **Drug addiction?**

"...the Washingtonians permitted politicians and reformers, both alcoholic and nonalcoholic, to use the society for their own purposes. THE AA HAND SHAKE

Can a handshake really save a life? Is taking the time at meeting to sacrifice general conversation with friends to shake a newcomer's hand one of our responsibilities? Are we practicing our AA Responsibility Statement: "I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible."

Think back to your first meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous and the way you felt. We come to this movement filled with anger, confusion, fear, depression, guilt, and total bewilderment. Many of us didn't even know what true friendship and unconditional love were. We have spent most our lives as the outcast to society, acquaintances, and even our own families. Things have gotten so bad that we have landed in an AA meeting.

The loving human touch is a very powerful thing! When I was new, I couldn't understand why so many people took the time to find out how I was doing. They would shake my hand, look me in the eye, and have a genuine concern for me. Here were men and women who weren't disgusted with me. They didn't give up on me. They loved me unconditionally. They showed me this love through these simple actions, such as a hand shake. As a result, I slowly began to build a hope that I never had in my life.

I have been set straight, and kicked in the butt in AA more times than I can count. However; I knew each time it was out of love and concern because there was always an AA handshake afterwards.

I realize today, that the feeling I got when someone reached out to me, was the loving and powerful hand of God. A love that I never knew existed. And a love that would ultimately save my life.

Let's not sit in our smug complacency. We have a grave responsibility in AA to reach out to the newcomer or even the unfamiliar face. AA is all inclusive and is a place of welcome for alcoholics. Never should I have to be a part of a cliché, or a member of a certain group, or any other extra requirement, to "earn" a hand shake and love. It has been my experience that, that is not the way God works, and his servants shouldn't either.

When you go to your meeting tonight, make an extra conscience effort to seek out a new face and shake their hand. You never know when God may be using you to save someone's life or your own! Jake J.- 3 Legacies

NO ONE KNEW...

Recently a member of the fellowship was in a horrific car accident. After recovering, he shared the details of the accident and said "no one knew". Outside of his sponsor, no one knew of this near fatal tragedy.

I was reminded of a guy in my home group who picked up a 17 year chip and shared that he was struggling and had a lot going on. He also said that it was harder to admit that at 17 years sober than it was when he was a year or two sober.

How many times have we (I) heard a long-timer say, "I didn't want to drink, I just wanted to die."?

Though, I am saddened as I ponder these things, it's such a great reminder and an opportunity for me to check in. Do I know the people in my home group? If I don't see them for a while, do I pick up the phone and ask, "How are you? Where are you?" Or do I just assume they're busy, out of town or they went "back out"?

My first year sober I came to meetings late and left early because I didn't want anyone to know me. Today, I am "plugged in" and accountable. We say we have hundreds of friends in A.A. but am I a "fair weather" friend or do I really know what's going on in your world?

I heard someone say "you can pretend to care but you cannot pretend to show up."

Thanks to A.A., today, I want to show up in the lives of others.

AA FITNESS PROGRAM

They are routinely jumping to conclusions, flying off the handle, beating around the bush, running down the group, going round in circles, dragging their feet, dodging responsibility, passing the buck, climbing the ladder, wading through paperwork, pulling strings, throwing their weight around, stretching the truth, bending the steps, stabbing others in their backs and pushing their luck. THE 12 STEPS IN PLAIN ENGLISH:

1. Alcohol will kill me.
2. There's a power that wants me to live
3. Do I want to live or die? (If you want to die, stop here)
4. Write about how I got to where I am.
5. Tell another person all about me. (let God listen)
6. Want to change.
7. Ask a Power greater than me to help me change.
8. Write down who I've hurt.
9. Fix what I can without hurting anyone else.
10. Accept that I'm human and will screw up. Fix it immediately
11. Ask a Power greater than me to show me how to live.
12. Keep doing 1 thru 11 and pass it on. (Deb C - Victory Group)

Rituals or Principles?

Are we in AA confusing the message with the message of rules, rituals and psychobabble? Annette, a former Delegate of Fresno, definitely thinks so. Speaking at a Central Northern Interior California Area Assembly, she said, "I don't know how a lot of this begins, but in my opinion it's sophomoric and immature. My biggest problem is pumping our clasped hands up

and down after saying the Lord's Prayer while reciting this mantra: "Keep coming back it works." Each year something new is added to the litany; most recently, "it really works, if you work it, so work it." I try to picture our co-founders Dr. Bob and Bill W. as part of this scenario, but I cannot."

In AA meetings, Annette continues, "certain statements are made with such authority, you'd think they came straight out of the Big Book. For instance, the question often asked at meetings, "Are there any newcomers here?" followed by the explanation that "newcomers are those sober under 30 days." Who says so? I was a daily drinker. To me, a week without a drink was a miracle; I certainly didn't feel like a newcomer. I know people who've gone to meetings and didn't identify themselves as newcomers; they waited till they had 30 days' sobriety, then said so. And some are slippers who have relapse numerous times – for sure, they don't feel like newcomers. How then did this get started?

Also, we are told to go to 90 meetings in 90 days. I don't see that in our literature. Some towns may have just one or at the most a few meetings a week and are many miles from other meeting places. Some may have to work at the time meetings nearby are held; or, perhaps some woman alcoholic, say, can't afford to pay for a babysitter 90 days in a row. Where do such decrees come from?

One AA said back in the '70's that our program is being diluted; I agree that it has happened. As my friend John W. commented recently, "Aren't we letting the practice of rituals become more important than the practice of AA principles?" It appears that we want recognition instead of being willing to grow along spiritual lines. I believe that it's time we started scraping a lot of barnacles off the bottom of the good ship AA so it can sail more smoothly. Think about it." (from Box 459, Vol. 43, No. 6)

SINGLENESS OF PURPOSE IS AA'S STRENGTH

Elaine McDowell, Ph.D., AA's new chairperson, believes that "member's ability to understand and adhere to its primary purpose is AA's real strength." Noting that, "The fellowship is a program of attraction rather than promotion, in the spirit of its Eleventh Tradition," she observes that "for 66 years the hand of AA has been there for the alcoholic. It works! To waver from its primary purpose would compromise AA's principles and diminish its effectiveness in attracting and retaining alcoholics."

AA's wide network of service committees – including Correctional Facilities, Treatment Facilities, Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community – "are all focused on making the hand of AA available to the suffering alcoholic," Elaine points out. These committees, made up of dedicated AA's will go to any lengths to reach the professionals who see, treat and counsel alcoholics. Even now many of them have limited knowledge and understanding of AA's singleness of purpose, which is one reason why a sizable segment of people still think of AA as a catch-all treatment program—they believe that if it can work for the alcoholic it will work for any addict. So the answer is to inform the public and professionals alike – in lawyer's offices, jails and prisons, hospital waiting rooms, seminaries, medical schools – wherever they are."

CHANGE ?? WHAT IS THE "BEST" FOR A.A.??

When our Central office/ Intergroup (Central Committee) was established back in the 1950's, our servants at the time took great care and worked closely with the guidelines of A.A. World Service to form our "Operating Procedures". Over time they have been fine tuned to our area, but the basic core has never been changed. Like our traditions our Operating Procedures stood the test of time, based on experience that worked. Now these same "Operating Procedures" are being asked to change- but WHY? What is the Motion? To remove the vote of our Executive Secretary, Financial Chair & Central Committee Chairperson's VOTE from the Steering Committee. Our same guidelines from A.A. World Service clearly states on page 2, last line, "It is suggested that the central office full-time secretary also be accorded a vote as well as a voice on the steering committee. This policy is successfully followed by A.A. World Services, Inc.: The staff coordinator—a paid employee as well as an A.A. member—also serves as a director and thus has a vote on policy matters." It goes on to say on page 3; "3) Authority and responsibility should be related. It is unfair to assign certain responsibilities to a paid secretary or volunteer without giving commensurate authority."

The Steering committee, and the votes taken there are only to make recommendations to the Central Committee (the Groups) where the final vote and decisions are made.

THESE SAME OFFICERS DONOT HAVE A VOTE AT THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

To remove their vote from the recommending body (steering committee), removes their only vote. Why would anyone want the responsibility that goes with any of those jobs and have no vote.

Our "Operating Procedures clearly state that our steering committee is a micro-cosm of the Central Committee; Article IV, Section 2,

Section 2.

The Steering Committee shall provide advice and council on matters when requested by the Central Committee Chairperson and/or the Executive Secretary when, because of the time and other considerations, such matters cannot properly be brought to the Central Committee.

Section 2a.

The Steering Committee's primary purpose is to oversee AA matters where the individual groups' action may affect either groups in the area or AA as a whole. It also follows through with any recommendations made by the Central Committee and make suggestions and recommendations to the Central Committee.

Section 2b.

The Steering Committee has the responsibility of functioning for the Central Committee in emergency situations.

How can a committee function in an emergency without officers having a vote? Why would the officers even participate?

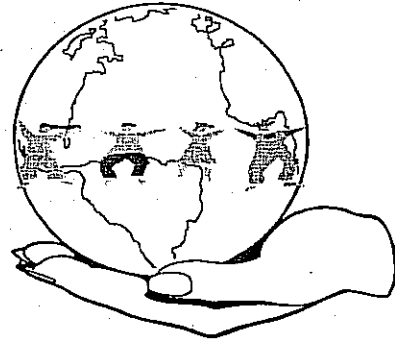

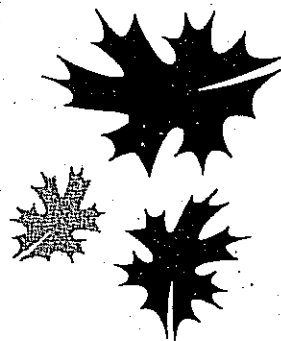


