The Survival and Growth of Alcoholics Anonymous is a “We” Thing!!!

Alcoholics Anonymous has been through some massive changes in the twenty-six years I have been sober. The one constant in all that change has been the united efforts of groups and individual members to carry our message of recovery to potential new members. This is accomplished in many different ways at great personal expense to those persons involved in those activities. Time is the most precious commodity individual members sacrifice for the good of the fellowship and we give till it hurts. We chair meetings in hospitals, sit on committees, represent our group at the Central Committee, take new members for the “meeting after the meeting” and hold positions of trust within our loosely constructed organization.

Several years ago we were faced with a crisis we had never before encountered. We flirted with financial disaster brought about by the actions of one of our trusted servants. We could not pay our bills and had to unite as a fellowship to “right the ship”. Individual members made anonymous donations to cover our obligations while still others worked endless hours moving our Central Office to a more affordable and accessible location. Our operating expenses were reduced by more than 25% and controls were created or reinstated to insure this never happens again. As a result of the efforts of our membership we still are able to provide necessary services to reach the still suffering alcoholic and their families:

1. Answering phone calls from prospective members and for meeting times and locations.
2. Print and mail the monthly newsletter, Central Committee minutes and Financial reports to all listed AA groups.
3. Participate in public information forums.
4. Print and distribute schedules.
5. Support a web site – Meeting Schedules On-line.
6. Manage our daily office activities.

7. Meet regularly in an idea exchange meeting (Central Committee), to guarantee that all relative opinions are shared between groups.

Whatever concerns were brought about by the dark period in our local AA history, we, as a fellowship have addressed them. We weathered the storm when a strong wind blowing from any direction would have spelled the end for our Central Office.

Today we are faced with a new challenge. Our group contributions have fallen off 8.5% (\$7000) from January 2005 to January 2006. Groups are giving less than ever before and the envelope system, once a mainstay of our grateful membership, has all but dried up. Our ability to continue to provide necessary services is threatened and, once again, we need to call on our membership to be helpful in any way they can. If each group that is now contributing were able to increase their contribution by \$50 yearly, we would be in good shape again. As your financial chair and a long time servant of this fellowship, I assure you your contributed dollars will be managed with the utmost care and directed into our life saving efforts to carry our message of recovery on the Niagara Frontier. Thank you for your continued efforts. Scott T. – Financial Chairperson

“Who pays the piper calls the tune,”

With the realization that A.A. must steer clear of outside contributions in order to maintain its autonomy and independence came the understanding that the money necessary for A.A.'s survival would have to come from individual A.A. members and groups. As Bill W. put it in 1957,

“Our spiritual way of life is safe for future generations if, as a Society, we resist the temptation to receive money from the outside world. But this leaves us with a responsibility — one that every member ought to understand. We cannot skimp when the treasurer of our group passes the

Where Money and Spirituality Mix

“Self-support begins with me, because I am part of us — the group. We pay our rent and utility bills, buy coffee, snacks and A.A. literature. We support our central office, our area committee, and our General Service Office. If it were not for those entities, many new people would never discover the miracles of A.A.”

Twelfth Step work is the lifeblood of Alcoholics Anonymous — carrying the message to the next suffering alcoholic. Without it, the Fellowship would wither and die. Yet, even at its simplest level this vital contact between one alcoholic and another involves an investment of time and money.

“Let’s begin with my own sponsor, Ebby,” writes Bill W., in the book *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*. “When Ebby heard how serious my drinking was, he resolved to visit me. He was in New York; I was in Brooklyn. His resolve was not enough; he had to take action and he had to spend money.

“He called me on the phone and then got into the subway; total cost, ten cents. At the level of the telephone booth and subway turnstile, spirituality and money began to mix. One without the other would have amounted to nothing at all.

“Right then and there, Ebby established the principle that A.A. in action calls for the sacrifice of much time and a little money.” (excerpted with permission from GSA self support pamphlet)

Emotional Maturity (Anonymous)

Some of the characteristics of the person who has achieved emotional maturity are suggested here:

1. He accepts criticism gratefully, being honestly glad for an opportunity to improve.
2. He does not indulge in self-pity. He has begun to feel the laws of compensation operating in all life.
3. He does not expect special consideration from anyone.
4. He controls his temper.
5. He meets emergencies with poise.
6. His feelings are not easily hurt.

7. He accepts the responsibility of his own actions without trying to "alibi."
8. He has outgrown the "all or nothing" stage. He recognizes that no person or situation is wholly good or wholly bad, and he begins to appreciate the Golden Mean.
9. He is not impatient at reasonable delays. He has learned that he is not the arbiter of the universe and that he must often adjust himself to other people and their convenience.
10. He is a good loser. He can endure defeat and disappointment without whining or complaining.
11. He does not worry about things he cannot help.
12. He is not given to boasting or "showing off" in socially unacceptable ways.
13. He is honestly glad when others enjoy success or good fortune. He has outgrown envy and jealousy.
14. He is open-minded enough to listen thoughtfully to the opinions of others.
15. He is not a chronic "fault-finder."
16. He plans things in advance rather than trusting to the inspiration of the moment.

Last of all, we think in terms of spiritual maturity:

1. He has faith in a Power greater than himself.
2. He feels himself an organic part of mankind as a whole, contributing his part to each group of which he is a member.
3. He obeys the spiritual essence of the Golden Rule: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

Emotional Sobriety -- Bill Wilson

I think that many oldsters who have put our AA to severe but successful tests still find they often lack emotional sobriety. Perhaps they will be the spearhead for the next major development in AA – the development of much more real maturity and balance (which is to say humility) in our relations with ourselves, with our fellows and with God.

Those adolescent urges that so many of us have for top approval, perfect security and perfect romance – urges quite appropriate to age 17 – prove to be impossible and how very painful to discover finally that all along we have had the cart before the horse! Then comes the final agony of seeing how awfully wrong we have been, but still find ourselves unable to get off the merry-go-round.

How to translate a right mental conviction into a right emotional result, and so into easy, happy and good living – well, that's not only the neurotic's problem – it's the problem of life itself for all of us who have got to the point of real willingness to hew to right principles in all our affairs.

Even then, as we hew away, peace and joy may still elude us. That's the place so many of us AA oldsters have come to and it's a hell of a spot – literally. How shall our unconscious – from which so many fears, compulsions and phony aspirations still stream – be brought into line with what we actually believe, know and want! How to convince our dumb, raging and hidden "Mr. Hyde" becomes our main task.

I've recently come to believe that this can be achieved. I believe so because I begin to see many benighted ones – folks like you and me – commencing to get results. Last autumn, depression having no really rational cause at all almost took me to the cleaners. I began to be scared that I was in for another long, chronic spell. Considering the grief I've had with depressions, it wasn't a bright prospect.

I kept asking myself, "Why can't the 12 Steps work to release depression?" By the hour I stared at the St. Francis prayer – "It is better to comfort than be comforted." Here was the formula all right, but why didn't it work?

Suddenly I realized what the matter was. My basic flaw had always been dependence – almost absolute dependence – on people or circumstances to supply me with prestige, security and the like. Failing to get these things according to my perfectionist dreams and specifications, I had fought for them, and when defeat came, so did my depression.

There wasn't a chance of making the outgoing love of St. Francis a workable and joyous way of life until these fatal and almost absolute dependencies were cut away. Because I had over the years undergone a little spiritual development, the absolute quality of these frightful dependencies had never before been so starkly revealed. Reinforced by what grace I could secure in prayer, I found I had to exert every ounce of will and action to cut off these faulty emotional dependencies upon people, upon AA (indeed!) and upon any set of circumstances whatsoever.

Then only could I be free to love as St. Francis had. Emotional and instinctual satisfactions, I saw, were really the extra dividends of having love, offering love and expressing a love appropriate to each relation to life.

Plainly, I could not avail myself of God's love until I was able to offer it back to Him by loving others as He would have me, and I couldn't possibly do that so long as I was victimized by false dependencies.

For my dependency meant demand – for the possession and control of the people and conditions surrounding me.

This seems to be the primary healing circuit: An outgoing love of God's creation and His people, by means of which we avail ourselves of His love for us. It is most clear that the real current can't flow until our paralyzing dependencies are broken and broken at depth. Only then can we possibly have a glimmer of what adult love really is.

Spiritual calculus, you say? Not a bit of it. Watch any AA of 6 months working with a new 12 Step case. If the case says "to the devil with you!" the 12th Stepper only

smiles and turns to another case. He doesn't feel frustrated or rejected. If his next case responds, and in turn starts to give love and attention to other alcoholics, yet gives none back to him, the Sponsor is happy about it anyway. He still doesn't feel rejected, instead he rejoices that his one-time prospect is sober and happy. And if his next following case turns out in later time to be his best friend (or romance) then the Sponsor is most joyful without any demand for a return.

The really stabilizing thing for him was having and offering love to that strange drunk on his doorstep. That was St. Francis at work, powerful and practical, minus dependency and minus demand.

In the first 6 months of my own sobriety, I worked hard with many alcoholics – not a one responded, yet this work kept me sober. It wasn't a question of those alcoholics giving me anything. My stability came out of trying to give – not out of demanding I receive.

Thus I think it can work out with emotional sobriety. If we examine every disturbance we have, great or small, we will find at the root of it some unhealthy demand. Let us, with God's help, continually surrender these hobbling demands. Then we can be set free to live and love. We may then be able to 12 Step ourselves and others into emotional sobriety.

Of course, I haven't offered you a really new idea – only a gimmick that has started to unhook several of my own "hexes" at depth. Nowadays my brain no longer races compulsively in either elation, grandiosity or depression... I have been given a quiet place in bright sunshine.

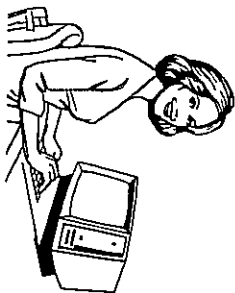


