THE CIRCUS IS GETTING MUCH TOO LARGE FOR THE TENT

In the early years of our Fellowship a group of prominent psychiatrists studied our membership to determine what, if any, characteristics we alcoholics shared in common. The answer shocked the membership of that time. They said that we were **CHILDISH, GRANDIOSE AND OVERLY SENSITIVE**. Judging by April's Central Committee meeting, we haven't come very far in the last 65+ years. There was unwarranted finger pointing, attacks on member's character, back stabbing and general pandemonium. AA's yelled back and forth as if being louder makes you more righteous. Women were insulted in full view of the body by male members who care a lot about who they think they are, little about manners and less about spiritual principles. I was truly ashamed about my behavior and the behavior of others. I hope I am not alone. Our first tradition tells us that our personal recovery depends on AA unity and it is about time we started figuring out that we need to leave our oversized egos at the door when we come together as a body. There is no room for publicly browbeating our trusted servants to play the big shot. There is no room for an ill-mannered membership that doesn't know how to act in public. There is no room for the divisiveness that has plagued this area for the last 7 years to continue. We really need to conduct a Twelve Step call on ourselves to insure we move into the future with the same love for AA that was demonstrated by our earlier members. It is every member's responsibility to insure our Fellowship survives the challenges presented to us in a respectable manner.

THE ROAD TO HELL IS PAVED WITH GOOD INTENTIONS

So my mother and the clergy used to tell me in my formative years. Like many, I have been passionately involved with what I thought was right throughout my life, and quite often I have been wrong and something was changed in a way that created more harm than good. More often than I care to admit I have had to work twice as hard to repair self directed damage than I would have if I had taken the right road from the start. If I had seen the future pitfalls of the decisions I was making I would certainly have chosen another way. I am passionately delusional not stupid. I find my experience to be more or less pretty human. Alcoholics Anonymous today is in just such a position with a passionate, human membership that is having problems choosing the right path to insure our future.

Through the efforts of Marty M., one of our earliest female members, the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence began to take shape in 1944. The focus was to raise the awareness of American's about Alcoholism and to lessen the stigma of being Alcoholic. Her efforts were followed by others who felt that alcoholism should be decriminalized and in the 70's that happened. At that time we had a membership that was growing exponentially (really fast) and our efforts to carry our message became overwhelming. This was also one of the earliest fears of our founders. The 70's also saw local efforts to get help for alcoholics. Individual

members, with the support of our fellowship, set out to access funds to set up local councils and still others rallied for treatment centers to begin accepting patients with an alcoholic diagnosis and stop throwing them into mental institutions and jails. We were finally getting recognition and funding to insure we were treated with dignity and respect. This is where our troubles began. The stigma of alcoholism was one of our greatest assets. It set us apart as a group of people who were hopeless outside of divine intervention. We stopped being moral lepers and a more rational approach was applied to our treatment. We stopped being hopeless enough to turn to a power greater than ourselves. We were merely misunderstood children of the world in need of help. Give us some encouragement and some money and we will be all right.

With this infusion of money and understanding the treatment industry grew and began to take over our membership and the formation of our attitudes. Treatment became big business and we supplied them with a never-ending stream of sots who previously would have sobered up on somebody's couch with AA's spoon-feeding them the program of recovery. Treatment programs became highly refined and AA became an unwitting advocate of treatment over program. By the end of the 1980's very few newer members had ever been on a twelfth step call. Twelfth step work became a process of delivering warm bodies, not necessarily alcoholic, to treatment to avoid the certain ramifications of their socially unacceptable behaviors. No one needed to do anything other than provide taxi service and wait for 30 to 360 days for their new prospect to become a member of AA in good standing. No personal effort was required, just wait for the treatment community to finish their work.

The City Court meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous was on the forefront of Twelfth step work in the 60's and early 70's. Much like Ebby's experience, AA's would appear at an alky's arraignment and have them released to those members who would take them to the meeting across the hall and personally involve themselves in that person's recovery. Now Drug Court (???) assigns every person who they don't know what to do with to AA in direct conflict with our singular purpose. We stood by while the powers that be (money and power) determined what AA should and should not be. At least when we were moral lepers we could band together in defiance against a system that told us we were no good. We were all in the same boat and it was us against a tide of public misunderstanding and mistreatment. Now we really have no spiritual rallying point for our self-respect. No cement that binds us together in a united purpose. We have become a product of those entities we threw our support behind. We are losing (have lost) our spiritual identity to well meaning persons who couldn't possibly understand the damage they cause by insisting that AA is a social tool to bring about conformity to their agenda. A tool to be manipulated to make their agenda work regardless of the consequences to the tool, much like the person who uses a wrench as a hammer. It works to drive in a nail but it destroys the wrench.

AA has never, and should never, direct the personal activities of individual members. Each of us has a right and an obligation to carry our informed message of recovery as outlined within our traditions. While those traditions are not rules, they insure our future and no individual or group has the right to portray AA in a light that is not in line with those traditions. With every misrepresentation of those traditions we further extinguish the light, which is the spirit of AA. Personal

recovery! Personal involvement with our prospects. Personal commitment to our principles. Personal love and respect for the members of Alcoholics Anonymous and gratitude to the program of recovery for restoring our lives. (Shawn C – editor)

The Traditions in a Nutshell

1. Unity – Hang together or die alone
2. One Authority --- Higher power/Group Conscience.
3. Inclusiveness of membership – only one requirement for membership.
4. Group autonomy – No ruling Class.
5. Singleness of Purpose – Carry this message.
6. No Affiliation – No ties to any other entity
7. Self Supporting – Give
8. No professional Class --- No paid sponsors/counselors.
9. Least possible organization- no ruling class
10. Nonpartisanship – Our Fellowship is our only concern
11. No one member is more important than the whole.
12. Spiritual Anonymity – do good deeds and don't get caught.

The 12 Steps in Plain English:

1. Alcohol will kill me.
2. There's a power that wants me to live
3. Do I want to live or die? (If you want to die, stop here)
4. Write about how I got to where I am.
5. Tell another person all about me. (let God listen)
6. Want to change.
7. Ask a Power greater than me to help me change.
8. Write down who I've hurt.
9. Fix what I can without hurting anyone else.
10. Accept that I'm human and will screw up. Fix it immediately
11. Ask a Power greater than me to show me how to live.
12. Keep doing 1 thru 11 and pass it on. (Deb C – Victory Group)

UNITY

According to the 12 and 12 "The unity of Alcoholics Anonymous is the most cherished quality our Society has." Think about it, we have an irresistible strength of purpose and action. Lives are recreated, families are reunited and employers reclaim valuable talent. All these things are accomplished through the application of the spiritual principles embodied in A.A.'s traditions and recovery program. We very much need each other to recover. Most of us have tried to stop on our own at some point and have failed. Yet we come to A.A. and the most hopeless find recovery and acceptance in our groups. "most individuals cannot recover unless there is a group.

When, therefore, we AAs look to the future, we must always ask ourselves if the spirit which now binds us together in our common cause will always be stronger than those personal ambitions and desires which tend to drive us apart. . . DISCUSSION TOPIC: BACK TO BASICS (April, 1976)
Are we, in the content of our A.A. meetings, getting away from basics?
Are we talking about our own recovery from alcoholism,
the Big Book, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions?

(Bob Bacon - Delegate, Northeast Ohio)
(Excerpts from his talk)

My name is Bob Bacon. I am powerless over alcohol and very grateful to be alive and a part of this conference.

Are we, in the content of our A.A. meetings, getting away from A.A. basics? I believe we are. Alcoholics Anonymous is growing at a faster rate than at any time since the '40's, and I suspect we were not ready for such growth. Have we gotten a little complacent and smug in our well-being? People today are coming to Alcoholics Anonymous in far better shape physically and mentally than most of us here did. We need to show them how we learned to stay sober. If our meetings consist mostly of drinking experiences, our ideas and opinions, we are not doing our jobs. Dr. Bob said our program when boiled down, is love and service.

We need to show all the newcomers that we love them as we were loved and we have a way of life we wish to share. If our meetings are nothing but drunk-a-logs and meaningless chatter, we are not showing them "How It Works". In A.A. meetings, we reach out with love and told people, "These are the Steps we took" and "We had to go to any lengths". Is that what the newcomer is hearing in our meetings today?

When a person comes to us after 30 days in a rehabilitation center, he or she is already dry and needs to know how we are staying sober. I believe our meetings are not really covering this heavy responsibility as effectively as we should and could. We do have some good news, such as Big Book Study Meetings. More and more in my area, we are going to discussion meetings. This new idea is from the Grapevine.

To me, it is vital to the survival of our Fellowship that we make certain the people coming to us for help are made aware of the Big Book, the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions as possibly their only hope for survival from alcoholism. If we fail to guide them to our program of recovery, our Fellowship will not survive. Our future is dependent upon a continuing stream of recovered alcoholics.

In today's frustrating world, our Program works better than ever. Are we doing a good enough job sharing this with the thousands of people coming to us now? Shouldn't we be giving these people all Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity and Service? We have to tell them more than, "Don't drink and go to meetings". If all we talk about is our drinking, our ideas, our opinions, my day or the way I do it, we are not carrying the message--we are carrying the illness. We should be talking about recovery. I don't believe we are.

Are we stressing the real value of the Big Book? You can go to meetings in my area

where you can't find a Big Book. Lately, when I am asked to lead a meeting, I have to take my Big Book with me. I don't want to lead a meeting that doesn't have a Big Book. We hear many people lead meetings and never mention the Steps or the Big Book. Is it because nobody told them how very important the Big Book is? Do we forget to tell the newcomer that what is in the Big Book can save his or her life? Our total Program is in the Big Book and only in the Big Book. Shouldn't we be telling people that?

We hear a lot of ridiculous things like, "There are no musts in A.A." My Big Book read different. People say that it is an individual program, that we can take the Steps any way we want to. Dr. Bob said, and I quote, "There is no such thing as an individual interpretation of the Twelve Steps." If we are not honest with the new people and tell them how important each Step is, who will tell them? Some people seem to think the Steps are a necessary evil instead of a lifesaving prescription for happiness.

We rarely hear about the Traditions. The fact that these came about because of our mistakes and failures is almost a secret. The Traditions are the lifesaving guide lines for each group and for our Fellowship as a whole and each of us should be responsible to honor them. When I first wanted to get a copy of the "Twelve and Twelve", a G.S.R. told me the Tradition pamphlet had all I needed. Thank God, I didn't listen to him.

In 1965 at Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto, most of us stood with Bill and said, "I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere reaches out for help, I want the hand of A.A. always to be there and for that I am responsible." Being at that Convention is the reason I am standing here now. We are the guardians of this Fellowship, and maybe we need to do a better job of sharing what it is all about. Are we still responsible?

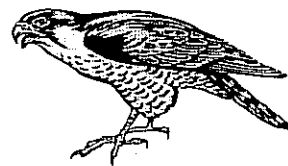


